CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE TALKING POINTS

Giving the Children and Young People the power:

In groups, work with the children and young people you support to create ground rules for image use:

Some questions you may want to think about:

How they want images/stories collected?

Eg in open spaces, closed/private spaces, in spaces they know?

Who do they want to collect images and stories?

Eg Do they want people they know to take their photos? Photographers? Do they want to create the images?

What support do they need during the image/story collection process?

Eg Who do they want there? Do they know how to stop the process if they feel uncomfortable? What do they need to know before the process starts?

What else do they need to know about where their images will go?

Eg where will it go? Who will see it? How will it be shared?

What else do they want from you?
